We have always shown great interest in school work and activities. We supported the Arrow-Head by attending the different plays for the Arrow-Head. We also supported it by selling subscriptions.


Our class enjoyed a weenie roast in the month of February. The evening was spent in playing games and roasting and eating (mostly the latter) weenies.

In order that the chapel programs might be made more interesting this year, all the classes consented to, each in turn, give a program in chapel.



These programs were enjoyed by everyone.






THE SINGING CONTEST

All of the letter men were not present at the time this picture was made, Jim Eanes Reese, Argyle Everett, Ory Beaty and Robert Carpenter.


Although the "C" Club was not as large this year as is usual, it was the best organization of this kind that has ever been organized.

KING—Tackle—160



EMERT—Tackle—155


Jess was one of our best linemen this year. You can always depend on him for his best when he was in the game. He seldom missed a tackle that came his way. We lose Jess to our regret.




Girls' Basket Ball


